ANNUAL COMMITTEE REPORTS 1985.PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

Preservation of our heritage through education and at times through action, has been the main thrust of the activities of the Trust; education of our members with meetings, speakers and tours, and education of a wider sphere with publications. We act to show approval and support for projects which preserve our heritage and we take an opposing position to those projects that we feel are not consistent with the objectives of the Trust. Thanks to the cooperation of our members, we have made progress in both areas. Membership at five hundred and seventeen has been maintained.

The themes of our regular Thursday night meetings have covered a wide span in both time and place, from "Early Acadian Life" to "A Holiday on the Canals of England". Dr. Peter Waite, our speaker at our annual banquet, entertained us well and at the same time gave us an insight into life in nineteenth-century Halifax. The decision to restore the 1867 Confederation Building on Cheapside for the new quarters of the Art Gallery of Nova Scotia, preserves an historic building and at the same time provides a good central location for the gallery. The restoration of the walls of Province House and of the Confederation Building will further establish the heritage aspects of this historic area.

The organised walk through the newly-developed area of Hemlock Ravine not only reminded us of the activities of the Duke of Kent when he was not designing martello towers, clocks or churches, but also showed us the natural beauty of the area from well-constructed walkways. Congratulations to the City of Halifax. Two tours this year went to Sherbrooke Village and Kings County. A number of our members enjoyed an organized tour of the stately houses and castles of Scotland and northern England.

In the publication area, we had a new best-seller, "Researching a Building in Nova Scotia". Progress has been made in the preparation of a revised edition of "Founded Upon a Rock", our first publication, now out of print. Our quarterly newsletter, "The Griffin" continues to keep us informed of the activities of the Trust and thanks to the consistent contributions of some of our members, gives us vignettes of the history of the province.

The height of the buildings on Brunswick Street has been a recurring theme within the Trust for twelve years. Consistent pressure from the Trust finally resulted in the passing of a resolution by the City Council to restrict the height of new buildings to approximately the height of the School Building at the corner of Brunswick and Sackville Streets. The building under construction on the opposite corner will reflect these restrictions.

Our nominees, Elinor and Philip Walker, were recognised with an award by Heritage Canada at their annual meeting, held this year at Saint John, New Brunswick, for the excellence of their restoration of the Walker House in Shelburne.

This year will be remembered in the history of heritage in Halifax as the year the Hart House was torn down. The Trust supported the strong representations made by the Friends of the Public Gardens to preserve what was an excellent example of Victorian architecture. The City has lost an enhancement to this corner of the City.

Acaciacroft - the Planters' Barracks at Starr Point was the central theme of a tour of houses in the Wolfville Area. The Trust supported the efforts of the Port Williams Group to preserve the heritage aspects of this early building.

This year the by-laws of the Trust were amended to strengthen the financial management of capital funds left to the Trust. A committee of five, chaired by the vice-president, now has responsibility for the management of the property and capital funds of the Trust. Efforts to set up the Macdonald Property in Windsor as a heritage house have not been successful. A proposal to sell the property is now being considered. We acknowledge with appreciation a bequest from the estate of Mrs. Mildred McLaren for the support of the work of the Trust.

As a volunteer organisation, the Trust has received excellent support from its members. Our successes are very dependent on the efforts of a relatively small group. The appointment of an executive officer, with adequate office space, has added greatly to the support of this group. Mrs. Audrey Crawford serves us well in this capacity.

PROJECT COMMITTEE REPORT

The main project in the past year has been the opposition to the twenty-one storey hotel proposed by 20th Century Developments for the site of the Keith Building (Green Lantern), Barrington Street.

A brief was given at the Public Hearing on August 21, 1985; Heritage Trust stated that "the proposed development is not compatible with the designated heritage buildings on Barrinton Street". On Halloween City Council approved the project in a close vote. In November, the Board of Heritage Trust decided to appeal the decision to the Nova Scotia Municipal Board and lawyer John Merrick was hired to prepare the case. There were three co-appellants (The Bean Sprout, Limited, the Eye Level Gallery and Atlantic Filmmakers Cooperative) along with Heritage Trust.

However, in April the four appellants decided to withdraw the appeal because of the added legal cost in proving 'aggrieved party' status before the Board.

**RICHMOND HILL FARM**  
**COLLEGE ROAD, WINDSOR**

On College Road stands one of the most attractive farmhouses in Windsor. A long driveway bordered by elms leads to the house which stands on a knoll. Nobody knows who built the house which is at least one hundred and fifty years old. When Lt. Col. Gordon MacDonald, the present owner, restored the farm in the 1950's, he found various foundations. At one time, there had apparently been many farm buildings. One foundation was discovered six feet underground at which point two silver candle snuffers were unearthed. It is believed there was originally an Acadian French farm here.

In January 1843, Johnson and Twining of Halifax offered the farm for sale. It was then owned by Francis Singer. Between the early 1840's and the late 1850's, John Otis King, son of Rev. William Colsell King, owned this farm. Then about 1856, John W. Maxner and his uncle Andrew Maxner, purchased the property. They paid \$20,000 for it, and the community predicted their ruin. In addition to regular farming operations, John Maxner planted orchards and cultivated strawberries. Contrary to local predictions they prospered. The house was in the Maxner family for many years. Andrew Maxner lived to be one hundred years old, an esteemed member of the community.

Later owners have been puzzled by evidence that at one time a day school may have been held in the house. In the attic were found desks and other objects related to school activities.

When the MacDonald family bought the house, it was badly in need of repairs. Across the front was a verandah, mainly of trellis, which they removed replacing it with two bay windows and a simple doorway. The old kitchen has become a living and recreation room and, with the added porte-cochère, it serves as the main entrance. The MacDonalds have furnished the house with much old furniture which greatly adds to its charm.



REPORT ON RICHMOND HILL FARM, WINDSOR,  
NOVA SCOTIA  
to  
The President, Heritage Trust  
of Nova Scotia.

Herewith please find the comments on Richmond Hill Farm as requested. These may be considered an expansion of the report dated August 29, 1976, that I prepared for Dr. Phyllis R. Blakeley, then President of the Heritage Trust of Nova Scotia. Since I have not been, at any time, a member of a committee charged with the care and administration of Richmond Hill Farm, I, alone, must bear the responsibility for the comments contained in these reports.

By way of preface, I wish to note that I believe that the Heritage Trust of Nova Scotia has attempted conscientiously to carry out the terms of the thoughtful and generous bequest of the late Mrs. Gordon Macdonald with respect to Richmond Hill Farm, Windsor, Nova Scotia.

Time and circumstances now require that the Heritage Trust of Nova Scotia must seriously consider disposing of this property in whole or in part.

Since accepting the bequest, following probate, the Heritage Trust has carried out such prudent and responsible actions as the following:

- (a) Renovated and restored farmhouse and ensured its maintenance.
- (b) Appointed a property administrator, pro tem.
- (c) Arranged for consistent tenancy of farmhouse.
- (d) Arranged tours of building and grounds for members of the Heritage Trust, as well as picnics on grounds, especially in early years of ownership, in order to familiarize members with nature and extent of Mrs. Macdonald's bequest.
- (e) Offered a room in farmhouse for use of local historical society.
- (f) Arranged for early inventory of contents of building.
- (g) Endeavoured to maintain basic bequest for nearly a decade.

While it is an attractive nineteenth century farmhouse with some 68 acres of farmland, Richmond Hill Farm has presented problems from the beginning of its existence as a property of the Heritage Trust of Nova Scotia.

A preliminary inspection indicated that the farmhouse would require considerable rehabilitation. The farmland itself appeared to have deteriorated, if earlier reports of successful use of this land may be taken as evidence.

The building and site lacked an adequate water supply, a problem that has yet to be remedied. A main source of water has been a rainwater cistern in the cellar.

Snow clearance in the long drive leading to the house would appear to present both difficulty and expense. The ownership and maintenance of this driveway is further complicated by an apparently unresolved argument that a duly established right-of-way exists along this driveway to another property at the rear of the Richmond Hill Farm.

While an attractive example of its kind, it is unlikely that this building would have, or indeed could have, qualified as a heritage building of museum quality. Nor in my judgement, would its inherited collection of furniture and decorative items, while comfortable and attractive, have qualified Richmond Hill as a 'heritage home', although as a unit, it has considerable sociological significance and charm as the retirement home of a professional military officer and his wife.

It must also be noted that the various actions taken by the Heritage Trust, its Board and Executives to date to dispose of a major portion of the furnishings of the house have, in my opinion, now nullified much of the stated intention of Mrs. Macdonald's bequest.

In conclusion, it may now be fairly said and shown that the Heritage Trust of Nova Scotia has made an evident and conscientious effort to carry out the terms of Mrs. Macdonald's bequest of Richmond Hill Farm to the Heritage Trust.

It would, therefore, now appear, that after due and prudent process, the Heritage Trust of Nova Scotia might well consider offering Richmond Hill Farm, its building, selected contents of the same and a determined acreage of land for sale, possibly under appropriate and acceptable covenant, at the best appraised value. Further, that the remaining acreage of farmland either be retained and rented at suitable rental for farming purposes or sold at best market value, bearing in mind the possibility of a sub-division being granted at some future date in view of its proximity to the town of Windsor.

While it is possible that this house and property might be sold properly and without challenge, a thorough report should be prepared that will complete Dr. Toward's excellent review of the the Heritage Trust's stewardship and document, in satisfactory detail, such matters as the following, before any final action is taken by the Heritage Trust of Nova Scotia to resolve the future of Richmond Hill Farm:

(a) A thorough deed search, including the present standing of any alleged right-of-way through the property. This to be complemented by an approved, professionally executed land survey of the property.

(b) Application by the Trust for such Court Order or legal confirmation and direction as may be deemed necessary and prudent in order to meet any real or anticipated challenge to the Heritage Trust's chosen course of action.

(c) Early appraisal of the building, selected contents and land to be offered for sale by at least two qualified appraisers whose professional standing has not been prejudiced by present or past association with the Heritage Trust of Nova Scotia and its activities.

(d) Dr. Liliias Toward's very valuable and perceptive report of 1st April 1986, has provided the best summary to date of the Heritage Trust of Nova Scotia's stewardship in the handling of Mrs. Macdonald's bequest to the Heritage Trust. It would appear, however, that there are a number of loose ends that need tying up at the earliest possible date. A detailed and confirmed record of such of the contents of the Macdonald home as have already been disposed of is, apparently, not yet available. Similarly, an equally detailed and confirmed documentation is also required of all contents of the house not so disposed of which are still the property of the Heritage Trust, notwithstanding their current location(s). It may be, for example, that, with the best of intentions, some former officers or members of the Heritage Trust may still be holding, in temporary protective custody, items from the Macdonald home whose current whereabouts are unknown to the present Board and Executive of the Heritage Trust and who would now be happy to be relieved of their onerous responsibility at the earliest opportunity.

(e) Before final action is taken, the membership of the Heritage Trust of Nova Scotia should be duly informed of the action proposed. After appropriate resolutions have been passed by the Board of Trustees and confirmed by a quorum of members at a regular meeting, or, if necessary, at a properly called special meeting of the Heritage Trust, Richmond Hill Farmhouse and part or all of its associated acreage should be advertised promptly for sale, preferably under Multiple Listings. Legal advice will have to be sought well in advance if any covenant is proposed or involved as a term of sale.

(f) All monies realized, after expenses, from the sale of Richmond Hill Farm should be carefully invested so that the Principal remains appropriately invested while the Interest is applied prudently in a manner best calculated to promote the policies and objectives of the Heritage Trust of Nova Scotia. The responsible administration of such resources would, I think, prove an acceptable, moral and compatible secondary response to the evident interest the late Mrs. Gordon Macdonald took in the future of the Heritage Trust of Nova Scotia as reflected in her generous gift of Richmond Hill Farm to the Heritage Trust "as long as the same may be deemed possible and advisable".

VISIT ANNAPOLIS ROYAL THIS SUMMER !

Musique Royale, an August festival of period music in historic buildings across Nova Scotia, will launch its first season with a gala concert and reception in two heritage settings on June 17.

Sponsored by the Heritage Trust, this special evening concert, performed by Musique Royale's artistic director John Grew, and David Sandall, harpsichord, and Valerie Kinslow, soprano, will be held in the historic Red Chamber of Province House. A reception will follow in the recently-restored Halifax Room of the City Hall on Grand Parade.

During Musique Royale's August Festival, four outstanding groups of musicians who specialise in music of the 17th and 18th centuries will perform: The New World Consort from Vancouver; Ensemble Arion and Duo Seraphim from Montreal; Edmund Brownless, Cologne, and John Grew, Montreal. Several of the musicians, including the artistic director, are native Nova Scotians. They will each play a series of four concerts, held in four areas of Nova Scotia - in Middleton at Old Holy Trinity Church; in Liverpool at Trinity Anglican; in Halifax at St. Paul's. In Cape Breton the concerts will rotate between St. Georges, a fine 18th century church and the historic Lyceum Theatre, both in Sydney; as well as St. Matthews Church in Inverness and St. Margaret's in River Denys.

Explaining the link between Musique Royale and the Heritage Trust, Lucille Stewart says: "We take an interest in Musique Royale because we believe it will bring to life our wonderful historic buildings with music played for people the way it was in the past. It is entertainment that will reach out to people of all ages and increase their enjoyment of the historic settings, the music, and especially of their cultural heritage."
