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SPECIAL PROJECTS COMMITTEE REPORT

In June 1993 I was appointed Chair of the Special Projects Committee, succeeding Joyce McCulloch who at that time had begun planning for a Fall Workshop. At the end of August the Projects Committee, with the assistance of Mrs. McCulloch, organized a successful all-day workshop on "Interiors" to be held in Windsor Nova Scotia on Saturday September 18.

The morning session, held in the Macdonald House was conducted by Heritage Trust's present tenant, Mrs. Beverley Miller, who had - together with her husband - done a great amount of work in restoring the interior of the old farm house.

The second workshop was at Kings-Edgehill School with guest speaker architect John Dobbs, who had successfully restored and rehabilitated the Old Convocation Hall, now a Library and Computer Centre.

Two more workshops are in the planning stages for the Fall of 1994. The first, on "Researching a Building in Nova Scotia" is to be held sometime in September; the second one scheduled for early October on the topic "Domestic and Religious Acadian Architecture" will be conducted by Dr. Maurice LeBlanc CJM, Professor Emeritus, Université Ste. Anne, Church Point, in West Pubnico. Details on both workshops will be published in the September issue of The Griffin.

## RESOURCES COMMITTEE REPORT

Nineteen ninety-four marks the 20th anniversary of the opening of Historic Properties. These Waterfront Buildings (as they were known when volunteers from the Heritage Trust worked so valiantly to save them) were our first successful "fight". Those men and women who were part of that first Heritage Trust success story have recorded their recollections on audiotape. Thanks to the expertise of Doris Butters, these tapes have been transcribed. Now we are working on refining them. In addition we are reviewing the Trust's future use of this material.

In addition to working on the Historic Properties project, your Resources Chair has also seen a way in which the Trust could support a very worthwhile project of the Art Gallery of Nova Scotia. For the first time the Heritage Trust of Nova Scotia supported a project involving our Mikmaq brothers and sisters. As Chair of the Special Events Committee of the Art Gallery of Nova Scotia, I suggested to the Board of the Heritage Trust, that we donate \$1500.00 to pay honorariums to the Mikmaq presenters who made the AGNS Family Weekend possible. What follows is an outline of that event:

"Siaw ' A'tukwey - Let me...continue my story". During Open House Family Weekend on the 6 and 7 November 1993, the Art Gallery came alive with the art, songs, drums, stories and crafts of the Mikmaq and Maliseet people.

The weekend coincided with the Pe'l A'tukwey exhibition and featured Pe'l A'tukwey artists Alan Syliboy and Margaret Johnson, chanters from the Membertou Reserve, quillwork by Sandra Simon, basket-weaving by Margaret Johnson and Caroline Gould, the making of Dream Catchers by Christine Brooks and shaved flowers by Eileen Brooks. Language scholars Wilfred Prosper and Bernie Frances discussed language concepts, while Christine Brooks and Vaughan Doucette celebrated the Sweet Grass Ceremony.

Over 40 AGNS volunteers, under the supervision of Deborah Carver, manned the Gallery for the two-day period, while members of the Special Events Committee organized facets of the week-end including social functions for the presenters who came from outside the Metro area.

Bernie Frances from Sydney and Trudy Sable from Halifax gave the Committee invaluable advice, and without their considerable knowledge and interest, this weekend would not have been the success it was.

In addition, Joyce and Paul McCulloch - who represented the Trust at the event - acted as very helpful volunteers, as did Pauline Hildesheim, secretary of the Special Events Committee.

In addition, the Heritage Trust co-operated with the AGNS on another project. Through the Heritage Trust Newsletter mail-out, brochures of the AGNS Art Lottery '94 were distributed to members. This event featured, as you will remember, eleven Nova Scotian and New Brunswick artists, and it (along with the Art Lottery Lunch) raised over \$26,000 for the AGNS.

\$30,000 was given to the Gallery by the Volunteer Committee (\$4,000 of which came from the Art Tour Committee). This money is allocated for Art Acquisition which ensures the future artistic heritage of our province.

Your Resources Chair has also been very active along with your President, Donald Patton, in the Carleton House project. Both of us have worked long hours to insure that this dream becomes a reality.

#### RESEARCH REPORT

Since June of 1993 many issues have continued or cropped up. The Brenhold case, for example, has continued. While our bid to the supreme court of Nova Scotia was unsuccessful as two of the three judges disagreed with us, one judge wrote a strong dissenting opinion concurring with our arguments. Justice Jones stated that the interpretation of Policy 6.8 which would allow the Brenhold development was wrong and "would promote the destruction and not the preservation of heritage property". "Such an interpretation" he said, "would be inconsistent with the Heritage Property Act and avoid the necessity of complying with that Act". Because of Justice Jones' opinion, the national importance of the Public Gardens, and the similarity of heritage legislation across the country, the Board of Trustees voted to request the supreme court of Canada to review the case.

In other research areas, some success has been achieved. Last October, the Clyde Street Terrace in Schmitville became a Registered Heritage Property of Halifax. And in April of 1994, two fine, attached Georgian-style brick houses on Portland Place were registered by Halifax City Council. Historical research for these properties was carried out for the Trust by Irene Fennell. Currently, Irene has been commissioned to investigate the histories of several Brunswick Street houses which the City of Halifax wants to consider for designation.

PUBLICATIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

The past year has been a busy one for the sub-committee of the Publications Committee. The Halifax book project has made considerable progress much to the credit of the research committee's extensive building research holdings. The editorial phase will be completed by Elizabeth Pacey, Irene Fennell and Margaret Martin.

The Colchester, Cumberland, East Hants project (Seasoned Timbers, Vol.III) has also made progress, especially in the Cumberland County and Amherst areas where Diane Tye and Peter Latta have completed most of the research and written reports on selected buildings. A meeting of this sub-committee was held in the fall in Maitland to discuss future direction for the project. It was agreed to involve additional research volunteers in assisting with work in East Hants, Tatamagouche and Parrsboro areas.

In September a special "Researching a Building in Nova Scotia Workshop" was organized to recruit and train volunteer researchers for the book projects. The workshop was made available to the general public as well. Special thanks is to be extended to Diane Tye, Elizabeth Pacey, Garry Shutlak, and Philip Hartling for their excellent presentations.

The enthusiastic response has indicated a need for more of these workshops. Another is tentatively scheduled in Lunenburg County area in September. Details and exact location will be announced later.

Jeff Weatherhead, a Halifax lawyer, volunteered to conduct several follow-up seminars on title searching (deeds) in February. These were available for book committee volunteers. Many thanks to Jeff for his expert advice and interest in our project.

Lou Collins is continuing his work on the "Mackay Sketchbook Drawings" book.

Nimbus Publishing Ltd., has agreed to publish all three books as well as the revamped "Heritage Colouring and Activity Book" which will be published within the following year. The committee's goal is to publish all three of our book projects within two years.

## THE CHURCH OF ENGLAND INSTITUTE BUILDING

Heritage Trust's concern about old buildings on the west side of Barrington Street in Halifax has led it to establish a steering committee to gather information and to recommend to the Executive and Board any strategies the committee finds would be useful in helping save the Church of England Institute Building, otherwise known as the Khyber Building.

The committee, under the chairmanship of Vice President Joyce McCulloch, is carrying out an active program of discussing various prospects with current tenants, prospective purchasers (or tenants) and City Staff, who act on behalf of the owners (City and Province).

The committee seeks a plan which would combine compatible partners, economic feasibility and historic preservation. City Council has made a decision to sell and there is talk of a feasibility study with respect to possible residential use of the third and and possibly the second floor, with the first floor having more commercial use.

Timing is as crucial as it is in most efforts to save an older building. Putting together a compatible partnership is not an easy task, nor is its success in any sense guaranteed. Economic feasibility is particularly important, now that grants from the public purse have become so difficult to secure.

Because the Trust's expenditures have exceeded income, spending power has declined over the past five to seven years. The Finance Committee has worked out a definition of capital.

Ian McKee has recommended that the Board pass the budget for the next year at a fall Thursday evening meeting instead of waiting until the new fiscal year starts.

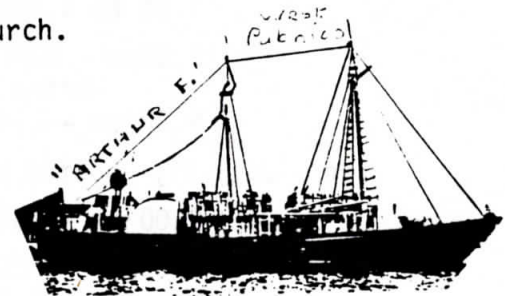

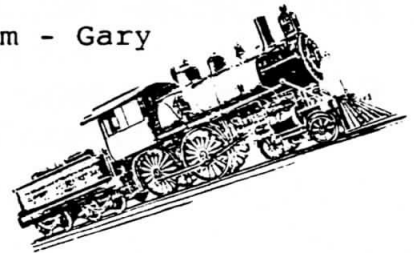
