Nova Scotia Lighthouse Preservation Society

The Lighthouse Preservation Society has been hard at work since Christmas seeking an act of Parliament to set up community trusteeship of lighthouses and set heritage standards. Since launching a major campaign on March 11, members have written and phoned every MP and senator in Atlantic Canada and are writing to MPs and senators in the rest of the country. Many supportive replies have been received and several meetings held with Nova Scotian politicians. Members have met officials in Ottawa and connected with lighthouse activists in Newfoundland, Ontario and British Columbia.

Interested in helping? Contact Chris Mills, 868-2313, or David Curry, 902-798-2454 (Windsor). A letter to Sheila Coppins, federal Heritage Minister, need not be long or polished. Just say you think Canada needs a Lighthouse Protection Act to set heritage standards for all lighthouses and allow communities to maintain and restore them.

Since the Coast Guard's Regional Advisory Committee on Lighthouse Alternative Use (RACLAU), was formed three years ago, the society has worked with the Coast Guard in the Maritimes Region. Although still committed to the idea of communities looking after lighthouses, the Coast Guard has run out of money to spend on the program, and its efforts may be stalled.

Lighthouse Tours planned by the Society for this summer and autumn,

include the newly-restored Sambro Light and Seal Island Light. A full list and details of the tours are available through Jim Guptill, 876-0724 or through the Society's newsletter *The Lightkeeper*, on the Trust office bookshelf.

Seal Island Light: As much of Seal Island has already been purchased by German interests, families who have lived and worked on Seal Island for over 100 years feel strongly that the Seal Island Light and surrounding land should be owned by those with strong ties to the island. Two long-time lobstermen, Charles Kenney and Randy Gorham, were instrumental in restoring the church at East Side Settlement, and in forming a non-profit organization that took over the West Side wharf from government. Earlier this year they met with with Coast Guard representatives who also suggested a letter-writing campaign—this one to David Anderson (DFO)—to change the policy of getting as high a price as possible for Crown Lands and instead let local community groups have the lands to benefit the area.

Coffin Island Light: Despite the lack of written guarantees from any government department that the tower and light on Coffin Island will

not eventually be sold, the Coffin Island Lighthouse Heritage Society continues with its efforts to protect the light from further erosion. A local marine contractor bid \$70,000 to place 250 feet of armour rock along the shoreline, and it is hoped that construction of the protective wall can begin by mid-July. Over \$30,000 has already be raised. Fundraising continues.

On Sunday, May 30, during the Valley Apple Blossom Festival celebrations, the Macdonald Concrete House was plaqued as a Provincial Heritage Site. Another Charles Macdonald concrete whimsy, the little Blue Cottage at Huntington Point, has also been designated a Provincial Heritage Property and will receive its plaque on Sunday, August 22, during the 2nd Annual Blue Cottage Family Picnic.

serious need of attention. Anticipated provincial funding did not materialize, so to prevent further deterioration the Society has applied an industrial strength silo epoxy to the roof. This will stabilize it and prevent leaks for many years.

Meanwhile, the Charles Macdonald House of Centreville Society and several of the property owners at the Point have outlined a five-year plan based on a use for the property consistent with Macdonald's wishes— i.e. non-commercial—and acceptable to other owners and residents. Consensus is that the site should not be developed beyond its current use as a residential summer cottage; the Society should undertake only those improvements necessary to make Blue Cottage attractive to potential lessees; and should try to keep it rented full-time from May to October.

A sub-committee of the Property Committee has been established to develop a list of needed repairs and necessary materials, and committee members will spend time at the cottage effecting repairs. Society members are also invited to rent the property for a week or weekend, on condition that some of the required work be undertaken. Bookings are available through Fred Macdonald. 902-582-7901.

Upon the death of Mable Macdonald in 1983, over 50 paintings and watercolours by Charles were acquired by Dennis Hapi, a sculptor from Toronto. Later, the paintings came into the possession of art gallery owner Don Ubell, who now displays in his Toronto home dozens of Maritime seascapes, landscapes and watercolours. They fill the Ubell's dining room—floor, table, walls and hallway. When Charles and Mable's great nephew, Fred Macdonald and his wife, Gordia, visited Don Ubell last year they were allowed to videotape the paintings as a record for the Society. Mr. Ubell indicated an interest in selling the collection and a hope that the Art Gallery or a private corporation might appreciate the value of what he feels is an important collection of Canadian art.

And now, after 30 years gracing the lawn of Edgar and Edna Spencer in Fall River, one of Charles' concrete deer family has been donated back to the Centreville property. The deer was given to the Spencers in the 1960s, when Edgar was an employee of Kentville Concrete. Though still structurally sound, the years have taken their toll, so elementary school art teacher June Jain, with the help of students, plans to raise funds for restoring the model by means of an 'Adopt-a-Deer' program.

Yarmouth County Historical Museum
